

Ungodly

But I fear, lest by any means, as the serpent beguiled Eve through his subtlety, so your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ (2 Cor. 11:3, KJV).

O wretched man that I am! Who shall deliver me from the body of this death? (Rom. 7:24, KJV).

Know ye not, that to whom ye yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants ye are to whom ye obey; whether of sin unto death, or of obedience unto righteousness (Rom. 6:16, KJV).

I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present (yield) your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God (Rom. 12:1, 2, KJV).

...when we were yet <u>without strength</u>, in due time Christ died for the <u>ungodly(6)</u> ...while we were yet <u>sinners(8)</u>, ...when we were <u>enemies</u>, we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, being reconciled, we shall be saved by his life(10) (Rom. 5:6, 8, 10, KJV).

He made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him (2 Cor. 5:21, NASB).

AND SUCH WERE SOME OF YOU: but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God (1 Cor. 6:11, KJV).

There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death (Rom. 8:1, 2, NASB).

...When the enemy shall come in like a flood, the Spirit of the Lord shall raise up a standard against him (Isa. 59:19b, KJV).

Since then the children share in flesh and blood, He Himself likewise also partook of the same, that through death He might <u>render powerless</u> him who had the power of death, that is, the devil... (Heb. 2:14, NASB).

GRACE for the <u>Rest</u> of Your Life

UNGODLY

<u>PREVENTIVE GRACE</u>: Qualifying for Grace; Submitting to God; Resisting Our Adversary; Grace by Design

This card is the "Ungodly" card—PREVENTIVE GRACE. We do not have to give Satan a foothold in our life, and we do not have to go down into the "Pity Pit" each time. Remember, Satan is the "Grace Snatcher." He wants to snatch any kind of grace out of our thoughts. That is why grace is a hard concept to hang on to. For example, we get a good clear thought on God's grace, and the next thing we know, it is gone! Where did it go? The "Grace Snatcher." A good way to review what God's grace is all about is to go back to the cross. How again were you saved? What did you do to come to know the Lord? Remember, it is nothing of ourselves; it is the free gift of God—by His GRACE! It is "ALL OF GOD" and "NONE OF US."

Qualifying for Grace

We do not have to fear Satan, and we do not have to give him an inch. This study is how to **prevent** him from getting a toehold or a foothold in our life. <u>Satan is our</u> <u>adversary</u>. He is against us.

Look at the first frame:

He may come to discourage you by saying, "You really blew it." "You really messed up." "You are unlovable." And if that is not enough, he thinks of worse things to call you, "You are a failure," "You are disqualified." Finally, he adds, "You are ungodly!"

Now move to the second frame:

The fellow is slumping a little bit, crying and thinking, "I am ungodly." Bad news!

Now move to the third frame:

Above the cross it says, *"Christ died for the ungodly"* (Rom. 5:6). As the fellow thinks about Christ dying for the ungodly, he first thinks about others who are "<u>really</u> ungodly." Then he thinks, "I am the ungodly one—and Christ died for the ungodly."

Now the fourth frame:

Then it computes — "Hey, that's me! I am the ungodly one that He died for! I qualify!" Now the fellow is smiling and clicking his heels! Good news!

Do you see that as a short cut? A **preventive**? Let's review. What we need to do, when Satan comes in with an accusation, is to call it quickly by the worst name that we can—*"agree with thine adversary quickly"* (Matt. 5:25 KJV). Call yourself "ungodly" and then affirm, "*Christ died for the ungodly*. That's me!" Thank you very much for the reminder, and on you go!

When Satan sinned, or made himself like God, he had "strike one" and he was out. The following illustration can be used to help our understanding. The man of the house is in charge of his home. Another man comes in and says, "I would like to take over now, why do you think you should have all this for yourself? I want to come in, not only be equal, but I want to take over." Well, what do you think would happen? That is not an option! He has no right to be there! God had to remove Satan from His "house." So one strike with Satan and he and all his angels were out of Heaven.

When Adam and Eve sinned, they were given an opportunity to come back, and be returned to relationship. They were given 'grace.'

Now for us, we have "four strikes," but we are still in! It is so amazing about God's grace. When we look at Romans 5:6-10, we find the following:

- Christ died for the <u>ungodly</u>
- Christ died for sinners
- Christ died while we were yet <u>enemies</u>
- Christ died while we were yet without strength

What a motley crew—ungodly, sinners, enemies, without strength (powerless and helpless). It looks like it is "four strikes" against us. But He is for us! <u>Jesus is our advocate</u>. This is what God's GRACE is all about.

In the third frame, note the verse inside the tomb next to the cross. In 2 Corinthians 5:21, Paul says, *"He who knew no sin, became sin for us, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him."* That was the trade-off—all our sin for His righteousness. See how happy the fellow (fourth frame) is, clicking his heels? Jesus took our ungodliness, He took our sin, He accepted us while we were His enemies, and while we were yet without strength, He died for us. Amazing GRACE!

And can it be that I should gain An interest in my Saviour's blood. Died He for me who caused His pain For me who Him to death pursued? Amazing love! How can it be That Thou, my God, shouldst die for me?

No condemnation now I dread; Jesus, and all in Him, is mine! Alive in Him, my living Head, And clothed in righteousness Divine.

Remember that when everything in us feels like we have blown it, that is what qualifies us for GRACE. It takes a while for that to compute in our minds. Even Paul knew how wretched he was and in Romans 7:24 says, *"Who will deliver me from the body of this death."* He asked the right question—<u>Who</u>? Not what, why, how, when, where, but, "<u>Who</u>?" He was delivered by the Person of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Spiritual warfare is not a 'power encounter,'

not a 'truth encounter,' but a 'Person encounter' (who embodies power and truth).

"And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; He shall bruise thy <u>head</u>, and thou shalt bruise his <u>heel</u>" (Gen. 3:15).

"For this purpose the Son of God was manifested, that He might destroy (undo) the works of the devil" (1 Jn. 3:8).

"The God of peace will soon crush Satan under your feet. The grace of our Lord Jesus be with you" (Rom. 16:20).

Note that the first paragraph of the poem gives Satan's true accusation. The second paragraph gives the superseding truth—the Lord's final Word.

Note the poem in the middle of the card:

I hear the accuser roar, of things that I have done. I know them all and thousands more, Jehovah findeth <u>none</u>!

Notice the "Tug O' Warfare" rope under the cross. The left side is pulled by Satan, the right side by God. The rope signifies the battle. We will call the fellow the "chooser." Which way will he choose—to the devil or to the Lord?

Romans 6:16, says, "Know ye not that to whom you yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants you are to whom you obey, whether of sin unto death or of obedience unto righteousness." It depends which way you <u>yield</u> at any given time. So Paul says in Romans 12:1-2, "I beseech you, therefore, by the mercies of God that you <u>yield</u> your bodies a living sacrifice unto God and do not be conformed to the world, (or Satan, who is the prince of the world), but be transformed by the renewing of your mind that you may prove what is the good, acceptable and perfect will of God." This is the direction we want to go...to the right, to God!

The pulls in each direction are also shown in the six statements by V. Raymond Edman on the bottom left of the "Advocate" at end of lesson.

The battle belongs to the Lord. He has already won! Note these additional verses:

"...For the battle is not yours but God's" (2 Chron. 20:15).

"...The battle is the Lord's" (1 Sam 17:47).

"Through God we shall do valiantly, and it is He that will tread down our adversaries" (Ps. 60:12).

So the battle is the Lord's; just turn to Him. Do not start fighting or arguing with the enemy. It is not our battle—it is our Shepherd's battle!

Let's go back to the third frame:

We speak of Christ's substitutionary death (our sin for His righteousness).

Fourth frame:

Here is His substitutionary life—His resurrectedLife living in and through us—His abundant Life (Jn. 10:10).

Submitting to God

Note the verses: "Submit to God, resist the devil, and he will flee from you" (Jas. 4:7). Submit to God, means turn this way to God—to yield. By turning to God, we turn our back on the devil—"Resist the devil, and he will flee from you" (Jas. 4:7).

"Submit to God, resist the devil" (cover the first frame), "he will flee from you." Look at the joy on the fellow in the last frame. This is what we really want for our life, but sometimes we do the reverse: we submit to the devil, and we resist God. But then what happens? (Cover the last frame). Even though we resist Him, we have His promise in

Hebrews 13:5, *"I will never leave thee nor forsake thee."* Remember He is faithful, even when we are faithless (2 Tim. 2:13). But what is missing? The joy and the victory!

Notice that it does not say, "resist the devil" first. It says, "submit to God." In submitting to God, we resist the devil. It is good to get that in the right order. Likewise, it is "walk in the spirit, ye shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh" (Gal. 5:16). It never says, do not fulfill the lusts of the flesh and you will walk in the Spirit. This is very vital as you read the Scriptures to always watch for that. It is always going to the Lord first, not trying to get victory over self, sin and Satan first. As you go to the Lord, He gives the victory and He takes care the <u>REST</u>.

Resisting our Adversary

Job speaks about God's protection as a hedge. *"Hast Thou not made a hedge about him and his house and all that he has?"* (Job 1:10). Note the verses around the bottom half of the card, making a **"hedge."** In Ephesians, Paul gives us this **"hedge"**— *"Grieve not the Holy Spirit"* (Eph. 4:30) and *"Neither give place to the devil"* (Eph. 4:27).

An interesting verse in Ecclesiastes 10:8b says, "... Whoso breaketh a hedge, a serpent shall bite him." Hedges are to keep out predators. Draw a serpent in the lower left corner slithering into the hedge.

This is a true story from South America:

A tribal man was bitten by a snake on his hand, and his hand swelled up immediately. As he was trying to get his motorized boat started to go up river for help, somehow the sparkplug accidentally sparked and shocked his swollen hand. The electrical current from the sparkplug permeated his hand, but as he looked at his hand, he felt it was getting better right before his eyes. Sure enough his whole hand was healing! He was so amazed that he went and told his story to the missionaries in that area. Later a tribal man, who was bitten by a snake on his ankle four days earlier, was brought to the missionaries. The leg was already swollen up to the knee with red streaks up his thigh. The missionary was reminded of the sparkplug incident and the electrical current. So he rigged something up; it was a life and death situation. He zapped the electrical current right around the man's thigh, above where all the poison had risen. It hurt, it was scary, but sure enough the leg began to heal!

Word spread. Soon after, as the pilot landed on an airstrip, a swarm of bees came and attacked his head and face. He immediately thought of the spark plug idea and tried it. It worked! This news spread fast. They found that the electric current works against the venom and <u>renders it powerless</u>. Now part of the overseas missionary outfit is a 'stun gun' or a similar device.

Let's say, Satan comes in and bites us somewhere. Suddenly the poison seeps in. Now, we can look at this two ways. We can start analyzing all the poison, chart how fast it is spreading and possibly investigate it out under a microscope. It is reality! There is a snakebite! It is going to take our life! We can analyze it until we die. However, if we know of the option of using a 'stun gun' or of anti-venom, it would make sense to use that promptly! The urgency of the situation, calls for the 'stun gun'. Why delay the healing by investigating the bite when time is of the essence? The lesson here is submitting to God as soon as the snakebite comes, and not just delaying until you lose out. *"Since then the children share in flesh and blood, He Himself likewise also partook of the same that through death He might <u>render powerless</u> <i>him, who had the power of death that is the devil"* (Heb. 2:14). So by using the 'stun gun,' which represents the resurrection power of Jesus Christ, He <u>renders powerless</u> him who had the power of death, that is the devil. Since we have the resurrection power in Christ, why not use Him.

The main lesson is to remember where our power comes from. It is not in us at all. It is a wonderful thing that we can run to Him. The world does not know about Him. Where can they go? Our encouragement would be to get this message out as quickly as we can to people so they also have a remedy. Many lives would be spared from death by snakebites if we informed them about the 'stun gun' (resurrection power of Jesus). You can see their plight, their helplessness, their analyzing, and their trying to find help. It is not working. Our only answer is in Him.

Proverbs 23:22 states, *"In the end sin will bite like a serpent and sting like an adder."* But, again, we have the victory; we turn to Him. This is the greater truth; Jesus can come in and re-correct anything that we may have gotten ourselves into. That is the hope that we have in Him. We have a redeeming and a restoring God!

One of the areas where Satan likes to get us is looking inward—to keep us from looking to Jesus. The enemy is working to keep our eyes turned within ourselves—what we have done, what we have not done. We should never expect to find any good in ourselves, *"For in our flesh dwells no good thing"* (Rom. 7:18). We will experience real relief when we stop analyzing ourselves and look to Jesus alone to transform us.

We are changed by beholding <u>Him</u>...not by beholding <u>sin</u>.

Grace by Design

Remember that He is our answer—turning to Him. He is our refuge, our shelter. Let's turn to Him in time of need. Since we are always in need, we can turn to Him all the time. Instead of as a last resort, we can go to Him, as a first resort! It is Grace by Design; not Grace by Default. For those who believe, He is precious, for those who do not believe, He is faithful. We might as well enjoy the Lord by submitting to God, and resisting the devil.

"Cheer up, don't be afraid. For the Lord your God has arrived to live among you. He is a mighty Savior. He will give you victory. He will rejoice over you in great gladness; He will love you and <u>not accuse you</u>. Is that a joyous choir I hear? No, it is the Lord Himself exulting over you in happy song" (Zeph. 3:16b-18 TLB).

Prayer:

Thank You, Jesus, for this grand tradeoff! May we continue to turn to You when Satan comes with lies, and with truth—the truth about ourselves. Help us to agree quickly that, indeed, we are ungodly; that there is no good in us, and that there is no use trying to look for any good. We are just to turn to You, Who is totally good and righteous, and Who replaces our sin and failure with Yourself. Thank you for a wonderful answer to life and thank you that Life is in You. Continue to teach us the truth about your **Preventive GRACE**, as we look to You each day. Amen.

D.L. Moody tells this story:

I met a man once in Scotland who taught me a lesson that I shall never forget. He had been bedridden for many years. This afflicted saint comforted me and told me some wonderful things.

He had fallen and broken his back when he was about fifteen years of age, and had lain there on his bed for some forty years. He could not be moved without a good deal of pain, and probably not a day had passed all those years without suffering. If anyone had told him he was going to lie there and suffer for forty years, probably he would have said he could not do it. But day after day the grace of God had been granted to him; and I declare to you it seemed to me as if I were in the presence of one of God's most highly favored children. There he had been lying all those years, not only without murmur, but rejoicing all the while.

I said to him: "My friend, does the devil never tempt you to doubt God and to think He is a hard master?" "Well now," he said, "that is just what he tries to do. Sometimes, as I look out the window and see people walking along in health, Satan whispers: 'If God is so good, why does He keep you here all these weary years? Why, if he loved you, instead of lying here and being dependent on others, you might now have been a rich man, and riding in your own carriage.'" "What do you do when the devil tempts you?" "Oh, I just take him up to the Cross; and he had such a fight there eighteen hundred [now two thousand] years ago, that he cannot stand it; and he leaves me." I do not think that bedridden saint had much trouble with doubts; he is so full of grace.

Watchman Nee writes the following:

The accuser of our brethren is cast down, which accuseth them before our God day and night (Rev. 12:10).

Satan is a murderer and a deceiver, he entices and he attacks; but today he specializes in accusing. Heaven recognizes this, and so must every Christian. Night and day he accuses us, and his charges, which are not unfounded, are directed at our conscience—the very point where we most lack the strength to fight him. His object is to drive us to think in despair, "I am a hopeless failure! God can do nothing with me!"

Conscience is a precious thing, but to repeat endlessly, "I am no good! I am no good!" is not Christian humility. To confess our sins is wholesome, but let us never carry confession to the point where our sinfulness looms for us larger than the work of Christ.

The devil knows no weapon more effective against you and me than the creation of this illusion. What is the remedy? Plead guilty to God. Confess to Him, "Lord, I am no good!" but then remind yourself of the precious Blood, and looking away to His glory, add: "But Lord, I am abiding in Thee!"
