RESTORING GRACE

RESTORING GRACE (Superglue): Nothing Is Beyond Repair; God's Perfect Timing; God's Glory as Goal; Re-Useable Vessel/Channel

Nothing Is Beyond Repair

Flow: Follow the superglue line from upper left to lower right.

Think of God's grace as superglue. Why does one keep superglue (or tape, screws, nails, etc.) around the house? They are used to repair things that are torn or broken. Likewise, grace is needed for repairing broken lives. Grace is needed because, to understate it, things are not quite right in the world. "Where sin abounded (increased), grace abounded (increased) all the more" (Rom. 5:20). There is always more grace for repair than the broken object needs—an unlimited supply.

Some people's idea of grace is like a woman who tosses dishes from her cupboards onto the floor to test how good the superglue works when she endeavors to repair them. (See cartoon in notes and quotes, at end of lesson).

How does something break (i.e., around the house)?—By accident, carelessness, undo pressure, wearing out, ignorance in how to handle it, vandalism, neglect, etc. Breakage is usually unintended, but there are ways to **restore** the object to its original beauty.

Restore means: to renew, return or re-establish; to bring into the former or original state. "Restoration described by this definition has become a lost art in our current age of easily disposable items. Mass production of goods has prompted mass reduction of intrinsic value; things are cheap. It is easier to replace something than to fix it. Sadly, this throw-away mentality has even infiltrated our relationships." (*J. Hummel*)

God never intended for us to be broken, but it was inevitable when sin entered the Garden of Eden. Look at the cup with the broken handle (on the upper left of the visual), "...I am like a broken vessel" (Ps. 31:12b). Then Grace entered and God provided a way back. Grace is a restoring agent. Notice on the visual how the superglue is aimed at the broken spot—spot welding. God is able to aim His grace at the specific broken areas of our lives. There is a battle for our lives: **Satan wants to END things, but Jesus wants to MEND things!** We should not focus, however, on how it got broken, but on how to get it mended, repaired or restored.

The value of the broken object is in direct proportion to the effort put into restoring it. "Christ's supreme investment on Calvary gives an important clue to the Father's estimation of the value of one soul. Jesus counted the cost and paid it in full with His own lifeblood. Christ's climactic victory on the Cross eloquently expresses His heart of love for the world." (J. Hummel)

The famous marble statue, *The Pieta* by Michelangelo, was shattered by vandals into hundreds of pieces. The situation looked hopeless, but Vatican authorities called in <u>experts</u>. Over a period of three months the experts restored the Pieta so that the damage can hardly be detected. The beauty of Grace is that no matter how shattered one's life, it is restorable or rebuildable because of our inestimable value to Him.

This leads to the next picture of the severely broken cup. "...Her sins, which are many, are forgiven; for she loved much: but to whom little is forgiven, the same loveth little" (Lk. 7:47). Those who are forgiven much are usually more thankful than those who are forgiven little. Those who have had more mending done are more thankful because they recognize the miracle of restoration. God is able to make us whole if we give Him all the pieces...from big pieces to thousands of tiny splinters. (Read Broken Dreams poem on notes and quotes, at end of lesson)

When we give Him all the pieces, we need to leave them with Him until such time as He is finished with the restoring process! Let us wait in faith and not interrupt His special work.

Give them all, give them all, give them all to Jesus. Shattered dreams, wounded hearts, broken toys. Give them all, give them all to Jesus. He will turn your sorrows into joy!

The Potter's House (Jeremiah 18)

We now move to the large cupboard: Welcome, RESTORATION. Let's symbolically put all our broken pieces into a bag and entrust it to the Potter. Notice the bag on the shelf labeled 'Rapha El,' which means 'God Who Heals.' "Remember not the former things, neither consider the things of old. Behold, <u>I will do a new thing</u>; now it shall spring forth; shall ye not know it? I will even make a way in the wilderness, and rivers in the desert" (Isa. 43:18-19).

Restoration calls for a miracle, but that is where God excels. "Let us then approach the throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need" (Heb. 4:16). God is always there in Person to greet us, never putting us on hold or substituting voice mail.

Often, when our hearts or lives are broken and shattered, we feel abandoned, valueless and useless. But God does not see us that way. Look at the various vessels on the shelves at the Potter's House. Now, carefully read B.V. Cornwall's poem, **CHOSEN VESSEL** (in Notes and Quotes).

Let's reiterate the last several lines:

Then gently he lifted the vessel of clay, Mended and cleansed it, and filled it that day. Spoke to it kindly – "There's work you must do! Just pour out to others, as I pour into you."

As earthen vessels, we are made from dust and will return to dust. "And the vessel that he made of clay was marred in the hand of the potter: so he made it again another vessel, as seemed good to the potter to make it" (Jer. 18:4). Dr. Walter Kaiser comments, "The marvelous truth of this passage is that spoiled, ruined, or marred vessels were not tossed aside and discarded in favor of those that emerged perfect. They were remade! GOD CAN USE CRACK-POTS!"

"And as Jeremiah attested (Jer. 3:19-42), no one or no object restores tenderly and totally the wounded, weary soul of a man except His Creator and Savior." (Roy Hession)

"You complain of weakness, feebleness, of emptiness. Never mind, that is what you were made for—to be an emptied vessel in which God can put His fullness and His strength." (Andrew Murray)

"Out of the surrender of our Lord in Gethsemane did come a cross, but beyond the cross lay an empty tomb and a redeemed world! As you look at your life you may see your own broken heart. Be glad that it is broken. TAKE IT TO CALVARY! There under the warm glow of His love, your broken heart can be welded together again, and your sorrow be turned into rejoicing. Be thankful for your broken heart, if by becoming broken we are led to Christ for the mending." (Charles Allen, God's Psychiatry)

God can remake our lives when we come to Him empty of our own resources. "Nothing in my hands I bring, simply to the Cross I cling." Sometimes the situation looks impossible to us, but nothing is too difficult for God. "Ah, Sovereign Lord, You have made the heavens and the earth by Your great power and outstretched arm. Nothing is too hard for You" (Jer. 32:17). "I am the Lord, the God of all mankind. Is anything too hard for Me?" (Jer. 32:27). "For nothing will be impossible with God" (Lk. 1:37).

God's Perfect Timing

Notice the clock on the shelf in the Potter's House and the calendar on the right side wall. These represent the timing factor in the restoring process. The clock is set for 7:00, and the calendar shows the seventh day of the seventh month. Seven is the biblical number of perfection. After 120 years of building the ark, Noah had to wait seven days for the rains to come. The first six days must have seemed like wasted time! Consider the walls of Jericho; there was not even a crack in them until the seventh time around on the seventh day. Naaman's hand did not gradually heal between the first and sixth baths in the Jordan; his healing took place on the seventh bathing in the Jordan River (2 Kings 5:10). Nebuchadnezzar saw seven years of discipline and deprivation (Dan. 4) until he acknowledged God's sovereignty. Saul failed to wait for Samuel on the seventh day and as a result he lost his kingdom (1 Sam. 13). Along with others, these examples from Scripture should encourage us to trust God's perfect timing as He does His work in His time in our lives.

Illustration:

A missionary was interviewing a young man from Romania regarding the horrors of life under Ceaucescu and the dramatic dismantling of his regime. He asked, "During the months immediately preceding the Revolution, did you ever anticipate that all this would ever happen?" The young Romanian answered, "Not for a moment." "What about just a few weeks

before...did you have any idea what was about to take place?" Again, he insisted, "We had no idea." Then, "What about just a day or two before the Revolution?" His answer made it clear that right up until the <u>very moment</u> when God intervened, the whole situation looked utterly impossible to those who were involved.

God's Glory as the Goal

"The deeper the need and the more bitter the extremity, the greater the opportunity for God to show forth His mighty power in our lives." (R. Goforth) The glory of restoration bypasses the restored object and goes to the restorer. Referring back to The Pieta—anyone who had seen the hundreds of pieces and then saw the restored statue would most likely ask with awe, "WHO was able to put this back together again?"

From missionary Ruth Hitchcock in her book, *Touch of the Master's Hand:* "Some of the critics in the villages said that we Christians were like the junkman who goes around gathering up old broken iron or copper pots and pans to make them over into something useful. We did not object to the criticism, for we knew that God is able to take sinful, broken lives and make them over."

"Jesus gets His glory—not in the number of good Christians He pats on the back, but in the failures He restores." (Roy Hession)

"Now in a large house there are not only gold and silver vessels, but also vessels of wood and of earthenware, and some to honor and some to dishonor. Therefore, if a man cleanses himself from these things, he will be a vessel for honor, sanctified, useful to the Master, prepared for every good work" (2 Tim. 2:20-21 NASB).

Re-Useable Vessel/Channel

Notice that the restored cup is now turned to the other side with the Dove displayed. "And hope does not disappoint us, because God has poured out His love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, whom He has given us" (Rom. 5:5). The Spirit is active in our lives now, and we are used as His channel, or vessel, to reach the lost sheep (Lk. 19:10) and the cast sheep (Gal. 6:1).

"POUR OUT TO OTHERS...AS I POUR INTO YOU!"

"My dear friends, if you know people who have wandered off from God's truth, don't write them off. Go after them. Get them back and you will have rescued precious lives from destruction and prevented an epidemic of wandering away from God" (Jas. 5:19-20 The Message).

"...And when you have turned back (been restored), strengthen your brothers" (Lk. 22:32b).

Emptied that Thou shouldest fill me, A clean vessel in Thy hand, With no power but as Thou givest Graciously with each command. (Mary E. Maxwell)

The Holy Spirit <u>in us</u> "will convict the world of guilt in regard to sin and righteousness and judgment" (Jn. 16:8). The Holy Spirit <u>in us</u> will rescue the perishing, care for the dying, and grace the failing.

It is the Holy Spirit's work, but He does it in and through us. It is the *Holy Spirit in "ewe."* The Book of Acts teaches how God uses people to reach other people. Philip found the Ethiopian eunuch reading Isaiah 53 and led him to JESUS. The Holy Spirit used Peter to present to

Cornelius and his family the truth regarding The Way (ch. 10). Paul remained blind until God used Ananias to restore his sight (ch. 9). **Each one—Reach one!**

Most of us also came to know the Lord through at least one person. God uses people to lead others to Him—people to people. "But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us" (2 Cor. 4:7). It is not that we have it all, or know it all, but that we are channels for the Lord to use—the mended, restored cracked pots. CHANNELS ONLY!

"I am but an earthen vessel, but in that vessel I carry a treasure of unspeakable worth, even the Lord of glory. All the worry and fret of God's children would end if their eyes were opened to the wealth of resources they carry with them, resources sufficient for every demand they will ever meet. Has it dawned upon me yet that the Spirit of God within me is a Person?" (Watchman Nee)

Oh, this great and marvelous God of redemption/restoration.

That's what GRACE is all about!

"I will restore to you the years the locusts hath eaten" (Joel 2:25).

How many years we are not told; only this: "I will restore the years."

Human lives are often laid bare – barren patches produced by our own failures; a wilderness stretching across our life. But what comfort in these words: "I will restore the years the locusts have eaten."

Have you been brooding over some sorrow? Has it darkened your life as a swarm of locusts might darken the sun at midday? And have you cried out in your anguish "The sun will never shine again?" But read the word He has promised.

Turn to Him, dear reader – turn to the One whom you may have been inclined to forget when you lived in the larger house. He is waiting; and if he does not see fit to give you back the earthly possession once so highly prized by you, remember this: in a higher and better way He will restore those years.

The years that the locust hath eaten sometimes take another form: years spent away from God in pursuit of worldly pleasure and self-gratification! How many have tried this! No wonder the fields are bare! Can God restore these years? Did He not restore the years for Naomi?

GOD CAN!

The blue water-lily abounds in several of the canals in Alexandria, Egypt, which at certain seasons become dry; and the beds of these canals, which quickly become burnt as hard as bricks by the action of the sun, are then used as carriage roads. When, however, the water is admitted again, the lily resumes its growth with redoubled vigour and splendour.

To create He had only to speak; but to redeem He had to bleed!

Redemption/Restoration is that activity of the grace of God that not only forgives a man's sins, but also restores and overrules all the loss occasioned by his sin. And what loss we have subjected ourselves to because of our folly, sin and pride... We lose our happy relationships with others, in the home, in the church, in the world outside, and we set people against us. We make mistakes and wrong choices because of self-will, and can find ourselves in grievous and complicated situations as a result. But failure with God is never final. Jesus Christ is the Redeemer of lost men and lost situations, whether the situation has been wrong for half a lifetime, or only a day. And when He moves in to redeem/restore, He not only forgives the sin we confess, but He also overrules for good the whole situation in which we have landed ourselves. And when He starts doing that sort of thing, He does it in style. He so often gives back to a man far more than he forfeited, so that he cannot go on blaming himself, but is lost in wonder, love and praise for all that grace has done for a poor failure like himself.
